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Mallee Cliffs Survey: 2018 Report

In late November this year I joined a team of 6 ecologists and 14 or so enthusiastic volunteers at Mallee Cliffs NP in SW NSW to help with the third annual survey of small mammals amphibians reptiles and invertebrates over the 58 Ecohealth Monitoring Sites within Mallee Cliffs NP.

Background Information

The Australian Wildlife
Conservancy's mission statement is
to protect all Australian wildlife, and
the habitats in which they live. AWC
is Australia's largest private
landholder for the purpose of
conservation. We work closely with
our neighbours in an effort to
promote and influence landscape
level conservation.

Mallee Cliffs National Park in Western NSW contains an array of habitats from open herbfields and spinifex-covered dunes through to extensive belah woodlands and pockets of old-growth Mallee. The habitats in the park support a diverse range of threatened and declining species including the Western Pygmy Possum, Southern Ningaui, Mallee Worm-Lizard and Malleefowl.

Mallee Cliffs National Park is located approximately 20kms from Mildura in far Western NSW.

Mallee Cliffs National Park is managed under a historic partnership between the NSW National Parks and Wildlife Service and the Australian Wildlife Conservancy (AWC). The agreement provides a new, ground breaking model for collaboration between the public and private (non-profit) sector. A feature of the partnership will be the establishment of a large (c. 9,500 ha) introduced predatorfree fenced area within the national park and the reintroduction of at least ten mammal species that have been extinct in Mallee Cliffs for more than a century. This project forms part of the NSW Government's Saving our Species program.

There are 58 EcoHealth monitoring sites located within Mallee Cliffs and these are stratified into the 4 most common vegetation communities: Mallee Scrub; Mallee Triodia; Open Herbland; and Casuarina Pauper Woodland.

Each monitoring site is used for long-term monitoring of vegetation, birds, bats, small-mammals, reptiles, amphibians, introduced predators and feral herbivores.

Summary

The enduring legacy for me from the survey was the inspirational enthusiastic energy of the knowledgeable ecologists and the dynamic passion of the young and not so young volunteers. It left me feeling confident that the environmental health of the Australian bush has a more certain future with such a group of custodians.

I learned a lot and was inspired to continue learning how I could be of more assistance to the work of the AWC and similar organisations.

I had planned to stay for the full month of the survey but the weather conspired to send me home earlier than anticipated.

I am looking forward to Wildlife Health Conference at Taronga in February and the subsequent Translocation Symposium in an effort to expand my knowledge and skills.

Council set to purchase old TAFE site for \$1.7M

Council has agreed to make an offer to the State Government to buy the former Tewantin TAFE.

Mayor Tony Wellington said staff were negotiating purchase of the II-hectare property, which has sat dormant since the TAFE was closed by the LNP Government in 2014.

"Independent valuations have confirmed that the \$1.7M price we've discussed with the State is very good value given the land's size, location and environmental significance," the Mayor said.

"A substantial proportion of the land contains endangered vegetation. So of course, Council is keen to ensure that this critical regional ecosystem is adequately protected.

The property is also identified as koala, black-cockatoo and wallum rocketfrog habitat."

"At present, the developed portion of the site amounts to one-and-a-half hectares containing four main buildings and parking for 95 vehicles. There are a range of potential uses for this facility that would provide broad community benefit.

"However, business cases will need to be developed to ensure that the site doesn't become an on-going drain on Council resources. Plainly, we are aiming for the best possible outcome for the community."

The Mayor said Council could also consider subdividing the site, then selling off the developed portion, while protecting the areas containing environmental significance.

Last night Council approved the purchase up to a cost of \$1.7M, subject to successful negotiations with the State. The purchase may be funded from Council's cash reserves, with some additional input from Environment Levy funds.

The Mayor acknowledged Noosa MP Sandy Bolton for her role. "Sandy has done a splendid job encouraging the State Government to come to the negotiation table," he said. "Without her input, the ridiculous impasse could have dragged on a whole lot longer. And we know that many residents are keen to see the future of the facility finally resolved. The hiatus has gone on long enough."

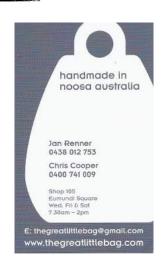

Some tips from Karlyn Pipes this month

Good body position starts with the head, look at the tiles on the bottom of the pool, try not to look forward or bury your head below the surface as this will cause drag and slow you down.

Shoulder rotation. many swimmers have too much shoulder rotation causing them to waste too much energy. Imagine your body is a surfboard then simply paddle your board quietly and smoothly down the pool.

Hand entry. For the entry place the hand just outside the shoulder the pitch of the hand is flat , not thumb down as this may cause shoulder problems.

Pull. Keep the pull simple by pulling alongside your body like a surfer paddling a board.

Catch the water. A great way to feel a high elbow catch is to imagine you are swimming over a very shallow coral reef with your fingertips pointing towards the bottom simply lift the elbow to prevent them from scraping the coral.

Kick. A good kick is small quick and fluffy not a big deep monster kick, don't let legs splay apart.
